Greetings to all of you, and a warm welcome to the large number who are receiving a mailing about the Asilomar Bible Conference for the first time. I'd like to take a moment to tell you about the developments that have led to the new vision and form for both this conference and its parent organization, Bible Study Seminars (BSS).

Over the last thirty years of speaking (and listening) widely in the Christian Science field, my study, prayer, and practice – as an Air Force Chaplain and then Dean at Principia College – have led me to increasingly focus my work around three themes. Two years ago I began to dedicate all my resources and time to establishing educational programs that encourage the deeper study *and practice* of these vital themes. My efforts are to promote spirituality that is:

- Biblically grounded, that cherishes the Bible as the basis of faith, as the door Mary Baker Eddy's
 Key to the Scriptures was intended to open. She once wrote: "If the Bible were properly understood,
 S&H [Science and Health] would never have been written."
- Christ centered, resting one's understanding of Christian Science on the criteria that Mrs. Eddy
 twice said was the standard against which she wanted her teachings interpreted: "Follow your
 Leader only so far as she follows Christ."
- 3. Relationship building in home, church, and community creating authentic relationships that demonstrate genuine interest in knowing people as they truly are, that encourage people to feel free to share who they are free of masks and pretense, and that nurture deep, strong, and authentic bonds of affection, forgiveness, acceptance, and commitment to each other.
 - According to the Bible, how we treat others expanding the depth and breadth of our grace-based love, honesty, compassion, sacrifice, and humanity – are the only clear indication of what we really understand about our relationship with God.
 - Jesus, in John 13:14 and again in verse 35 (in case the disciples like us might have
 missed it the first time) said that the depth to which they loved one another was the way
 people would know that they were his disciples. Acts reaffirms that this sacrificial, not
 superficial, capacity to love was how the Spirit distinguished the church, and Roman
 observers repeatedly noted that this was the distinguishing feature of early Christianity.
 - Mrs. Eddy referred to this relational standard when she delineated that "the test of <u>all</u> prayer" is whether or not "we love our neighbor better for this asking," and have let go of the "old selfishness" and its habit of professing piety way in advance of practicing it.

In the promotion of these ideas, my educational activities have taken place in many venues: from regularly teaching a class at Principia Upper School, to speaking at churches, colleges, camps, youth events, nursing facilities, Prin Clubs, as well as relationship and marriage seminars around the country. I founded Higher Ground as a professional educational ministry to further develop these three themes. In doing so, I joined with an amazing group of dedicated Christian Scientists who have also embraced these themes and have spoken or performed at, and in other cases sponsored or supported, this nascent activity throughout the nation. In its first two years Higher Ground has held fifteen regional Bible Conferences in eleven cities with many more planned.

Christ Centered

As Higher Ground launched, it became clear that the promotion of these themes or virtues could also be well served by a non-profit corporation whose tax-exempt status could assist in funding projects that Higher Ground couldn't – like the creation of an affordable, non-sectarian Bible Study curriculum developed by a faculty of Bible scholars. Forming BSS, with the partnership of a trusted friend who is also a CPA, Linda Bargmann, was the next step. You can learn more about Linda and her family in *The Christian Science Sentinels* of April 18, 2005, and the special children's edition of September 26, 2005. Together, Linda and I gathered a Board of Directors and became a Missouri-based, non-profit corporation that is seeking tax-exempt status from the IRS.



The most immediate thrust of our efforts at BSS has been to promote and expand the Asilomar Bible Conference now in our care. This conference was founded and led for many years by Dorothy Herfurt, and then successively directed by Jan Kater, Frank Darling, and Russell Robinson. We are so grateful for the work of all these individuals and that Russell Robinson, along with his partners Caryl Krueger and Jackie Shay Riegel, conveyed this conference to us in such fine condition.

Linda and I have already taken several steps to further insure the future of this wonderful conference by making it free to young people under thirty, varying the educational forms of learning and allowing people to customize the experience and pace of the conference (including lodging options). To better accommodate working people, this year's conference will begin on Friday night and provide a weekend learning experience as well as weekday programs following.

On the pages of this mailing, you will meet the extraordinary faculty and presenters – all dedicated Christian Scientists -- and find the schedule reflecting on this year's conference theme from Micah 6:8 "What Does the Lord Require?" I invite you to join

Prophets did not gaze into crystal balls. They were called by God (often kicking and screaming) to confront rulers and the people of Israel in calling them to remember who they were and what God wanted – very much akin to what the Holy Spirit or divine Comforter did in the early Church. Breakouts

Breakouts are an alternative form of learning to the lecture format. The faculty has been working hard to demonstrate this format better, as this is a new form of teaching for many of us. Done well, a good breakout is not a mini-lecture, or just a good discussion, but a shared discovery experience that makes the lessons learned more vital and practiced than is often the case in a lecture.

At Asilomar 2006, all of the breakouts focus on the lecture topics already presented by various speakers – so that attendees have some background in the subject area as they go into the session. Each topic will be repeated twice and sessions are 75 minutes in length (1:30 – 2:45 and 3:15 – 4:30) with a half-hour break in between. The topics are as follows:

Following the Scriptural Blueprint: Linking Jesus' words to the Old Testament with Genelle Austin-Lett

Examine the way in which Jesus responded to the events in his life with the words of the Old Testament. Jesus always used familiar scripture with the disciples, Scribes, and Pharisees, but opened it to reveal the spirit of the Word, not the letter.

Faith & Works in Old Testament Concepts: Their Possible Impact on Paul and James with Mary Jane Chaignot

How does what has become the predominant view of Christian theology, that justification (or salvation/wholeness/healing) comes by faith, fit in with the Old Testament concept of Covenant where obedience = blessing; disobedience = judgment?

Letting Paul Guide Us for God's Requirements in our own Lives with Madelon Maupin-Miles

Examine in greater depth the specific letters Paul wrote and what he confronted. What are the parallels in our present day to these issues, and how can Paul's responses inform our approach to discipleship and church commitment.

In the Same Boat with Peter: Call and Response: To walk humbly with our God (Micah 6:8) with Helen Mathis

A boat full of disciples at sea, tossed with waves and pushed about by a "contrary wind," became a metaphor for the early church. What does Jesus' response say to the church today?

Uncoupling the Odd Couple: Elijah and Elisha with

Ginny Stopfel

Teacher and protégé – but very individual. How did they relate? How did they differ?


